Dear Members and Friends,

First and foremost, thank you for the guidance you have provided us. Our budget and legislative proposals would not have been possible without your invaluable input. We value our relationship and hope to continue our productive discussions going forward.

To that end, we want to highlight some budget items and give you an early briefing on our legislative package. First, please see attached Revised Estimates of Statutory Formula Grants, including town-by-town runs. In our most recent review, we discovered a few corrections and wanted to immediately inform you as our partner in communicating with local municipalities.

Attached are the soon to be released Fact Sheets for three of our bills with respect to municipal and regional issues: (1) An Act Concerning Municipal and Regional Opportunities and Efficiencies, (2) An Act Concerning Municipal Arbitration and the Municipal Employees Retirement System, and (3) An Act Concerning Education Initiatives and Services in Connecticut. These bills contain some of your direct recommendations from OPM's meetings with you. We hope you will be pleased and supportive.

With respect to the budget, attached is a Budget Summary and a Budget Q&A. You should know that our budget provides municipalities with predictability by level-funding non-education grants at historical levels. In addition, we are honoring the ECS formula to bring underfunded districts closer to full funding.

Teachers' Retirement System (TRS)

We are proposing that municipalities make a small contribution towards normal costs of teacher's pension salaries, gently phasing it in over three years. Unlike Governor Malloy's proposal, municipal cost sharing does not include the unfunded liability, it is only for normal costs, only for a small portion thereof and is respectfully phased in over a 3 year period. Towns with above-average salaries would contribute an additional amount.

Our proposal re-frames the relationship with towns for the normal costs of TRS by linking wages negotiated at the local level with the teacher pension costs. Under the new proposal, each

municipality or local board of education (excluding those designated as Distressed Municipalities by the Department of Economic and Community Development) remits at least one-quarter of the normal cost paid on its behalf by the state. To reflect the relationship between negotiated wages and pension liabilities, towns with average teacher salaries higher than the statewide median average teacher salary contribute an additional percentage of their normal cost equal to their marginal percentage above the statewide median salary. For example, if a town's average teacher salary is 10% above the statewide median average teacher salary, such town would contribute the baseline 25% contribution plus an additional 10 percentage points for a total of 35% of normal costs, phased in over a three year period. We have adjusted the MBR statutory language to allow Alliance districts to use up to 50% of an ECS increase towards fixed costs such as the TRS contribution. The Governor's intent is provide districts with greater flexibility. We would be happy to work with you on additional ways to adjust MBR.

To maintain this new intergovernmental relationship without placing a heavy burden on struggling towns and cities, all distressed municipalities contribute only five percent of their associated normal cost. Previous proposals sought to make municipalities responsible for one-third of the normal costs and unfunded liability of the underfunded Teachers' Retirement System. The Governor believes that's not fair – municipalities should not be penalized for bad decisions in the past where they had no control. The approach in this budget ensures that municipalities have "skin in the game" and share the responsibility for funding the normal cost based on decisions made at the local level. Again, this approach is phased-in over three years and results in contributions from municipalities of \$23.8M in FY 20 and \$49.2M in FY 21.

Educational Cost Sharing (ECS)

The ECS formula passed in PA 17-2 JSS is largely unchanged except for two factors: (1) The phase out of the grants for towns whose fully funded grant is less than the current level; and (2) The replacement of the outmoded Free and Reduced Price Lunch metric that is used in the calculation. Updated October 1, 2018 statistics such as resident student count, median household income, and population are used pursuant to the current statute.

- The phase down of towns who would see decreases in their grant as they are phased down to their fully funded grant is accelerated. Current statute phases them down by 8.33% through FY 2028. The Governor's budget and implementer would accelerate this by phasing them down by 25% through FY 2022 at which point they would receive their fully funded grant as calculated by the formula.
- Free and Reduced Price Lunch statistics have been problematic since the change to community eligibility and had been previously due to the data being dependent upon selfreporting from families. This metric is changed to direct certification counts that are also used in the calculation of nutrition funding at SDE.

HOUSE BILL ## LCO 4579 AN ACT CONCERNING MUNICIPAL AND REGIONAL OPPORTUNITIES AND EFFICIENCIES

Summary of Proposal:

This proposal provides for earlier detection of fiscally distressed municipalities so that steps can be taken to ensure financial stability; takes concrete steps to identify opportunities, plan for and implement the sharing and consolidation of services within municipalities, among municipalities and on a regional basis; and provides the funding to incentivize the streamlining of state, regional and local service delivery.

Reason for Proposal:

Connecticut's balkanized map of 169 municipalities, numerous overlapping local and regional territories and bodies, has helped create our state's fiscal challenges and the drag they have had on our economy. This package is a step forward in unraveling and restructuring our governance to make it more streamlined, efficient, cost-effective and have the capacity to provide higher quality services.

Significant Impacts:

Section 1. New Criteria for Early Detection of Financially Distressed Municipalities for Referral to the Municipal Finance Advisory Council (MFAC) for Corrective Action. Enables the Secretary of the Office of Policy and Management (OPM) to make findings after review of municipal and regional school district audits and, if the audits were not done properly or reveal irregularities, require the municipality or district to explain the findings and submit a plan to take corrective action. Provides the Secretary with the ability to identify a financially distressed municipality earlier and refer them to the MFAC. The referral is based upon the evaluation of certain fiscal indicators, including low or declining fund balance, operating deficits, repetitive use of tax or bond anticipation notes to maintain cash flow, or low bond rating. The MFAC is charged with helping to develop and implement corrective action plans to promote the long-term fiscal health of the municipality.

- Sections 2 3. Restructure and Reinvigorate the Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations (ACIR) to Develop Specific Plans to Streamline State Regional and Local Service Delivery. The membership of ACIR is enhanced by adding the Co-chairs and Ranking Members of the Planning and Development Committee and a representative of Labor. ACIR is tasked with analyzing, planning and implementing all aspects of the sharing and consolidation of government services and provided with 13 specific areas of inquiry, that encompass subjects such as the alignment of regions, opportunities for intra-municipal and inter-municipal consolidation and the provision of services regionally, standardization of reporting among governing bodies and enhanced data collection. ACIR is required to make specific recommendations to the Secretary every six months on how to better share services among the state, regional and local levels. Yearly reports will contain metrics to determine progress on the recommendations and work plans.
- Sections 4 6. Create a New Regional Performance Incentive Program (RPIP) and Accompanying Grants to Plan and Implement the Sharing and Consolidation of State, Regional and Local Services. Funding provided for the efforts of ACIR described above. A new base grant formula is established for distributing Regional Services Grants to the Regional Councils of Governments (COGs) from the Regional Planning Incentive Account. The Secretary is given the discretion to provide funding for the joint provision of any government service or for a planning study on the sharing of services on a regional basis. ACIR is connected to the grant process as it is tasked with making recommendations on funding to achieve cost savings through regional efficiencies to COGs, Regional Educational Service Centers and other regional bodies or combination thereof.
- **Section 7.** Creates the Commission on Shared School Services (COSSS). Establishes COSSS to develop a plan for the redistricting or consolidation of school services and school districts. With legislative and gubernatorial appointments, COSSS is to begin work 30 days after passage of the bill. It is staffed by the State Department of Education, with funding of \$800,000 provided in the budget for staff and consultants, and terminates on June 30, 2027.
- Section 8 9. Require COSSS to Engage in a Detailed Planning Process and Provides for the Solicitation of Proposals. Charges COSSS with developing a plan and consulting ACIR. It may establish subcommittees and working groups and conduct hearings. It is to develop 16 reports and recommendations involving myriad stakeholders on a range of topics between November 1, 2019 and October 1, 2020, with a comprehensive report due no later than December 1, 2020 and a hearing by December 15, 2020. Subsequent recommendations may follow. Requires the Department of Education (SDE) to solicit proposals through a Request for Information for cooperative arrangements, regionalization of education, and incentives by March 1, 2020, and to share the results with COSSS.

- Services. By September 15, 2019, each municipality and their respective school districts must report to OPM, SDE and Administrative Services (DAS), on the services that have been shared or consolidated. By January 1, 2020, each municipality and their respective school districts, in consultation with ACIR and COSSS, must report to OPM, SDE and DAS, on the services that will be shared or consolidated. The Secretary will share these reports with ACIR and COSSS.
- Section 11. Makes Technical Changes Due to Other Changes in the Bill.
- **Section 12.** <u>Funding for Shared or Regional Services</u>. Provides for OPM expending \$250,000 to promote and facilitate the implementation of shared or regional government services.
- **Section 13.** Coordinates Revaluation Cycles for Towns Within Five Revaluation Zones. Establishes COGs and groups of COGs into five Revaluation Zones and then, in accordance with a schedule set by the Secretary, coordinates the revaluation cycles of the municipalities within each zone over a five year period.
- Section 14. Makes the COGs the "Back Office" for Certain Municipalities for Reassessment and Revaluation. Provides for the establishment of Regional Assessment Divisions at the COGs by July 1, 2020 for the collection and processing of data for the 146 municipalities with fewer than 15,000 parcels and requires such municipalities to provide data to the state or be penalized.
- **Sections 15 20.** Consolidate Tax Collection and Assessment Functions. Makes tax collectors appointed positions as of July 1, 2019, except that those elected prior to such date can fill out their terms. Requires municipalities with fewer than 15,000 parcels to merge their tax collector and assessors departments by July 1, 2022.
- **Section 21.** Allows Municipalities to Override their Charters to Share or Consolidate Services. Under current law (CGS Sec. 7-148cc), two or more municipalities may jointly perform any function that they could perform separately. This section provides that no charter, special act, home rule ordinance or local law can prevent two or more municipalities from combining to jointly perform services.
- **Sections 22 24.** Promote Consolidation of Public Service Answering Points (PSAPs). Promotes the merger of 60 single town PSAPs (emergency dispatching) with populations of less than 40,000, by providing additional transition grant money from the Emergency 9-1-1 Program to defray the upfront costs of consolidation. Any municipality with a population of less than 40,000 who have not combined their PSAP with two or more municipalities by June 30, 2024, will no longer receive annual subsidies from the Program.

Section 25. <u>Decreases the Number of Mandated Inspections by Fire Marshals</u>. The requirement that Fire Marshals inspect residential buildings with three to sixteen families annually is changed as follows:

- Three to six family buildings once every three years; and
- Seven to sixteen family buildings once every two calendar years.

Section 26. Requires Boards of Education to Act upon Collective Bargaining Agreements. The bargaining representative for a board of education must submit any collective bargaining agreement to the board within 14 days of the date the agreement was reached, and the board must act upon such agreement within 30 days of submission.

SENATE BILL ## LCO 4446 AN ACT CONCERNING MUNICIPAL ARBITRATION AND THE MUNICIPAL EMPLOYEES RETIREMENT SYSTEM

Summary of Proposal:

This proposal accomplishes three things. First, it revises the selection process for the neutral arbitrators that chair municipal arbitration panels. Second, it gradually increases employee contributions to the Municipal Employees' Retirement System (MERS) over a three-year period. Lastly, it charges the Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations with recommending a new tier for the MERS modeled after the State Employee Retirement System.

Reason for Proposal:

To increase fairness in arbitrations and to reduce municipal costs by bringing employee contributions to MERS in line with employee contributions in other states and recommending the first new MERS tier since the system was established in 1947.

Section Details:

Sec. 1 calls for the neutral arbitrator on municipal arbitration panels to be selected at random rather than by the other two members of the arbitration panel. It also decreases the size of the pool of neutral arbitrators from twenty to ten members and increases the term of members from two to five years.

Sec. 2 increases the employee contribution to the Municipal Employees' Retirement System (MERS) by two percent for each of the next three fiscal years beginning on July 1, 2019.

For employees not contributing to Social Security, the current contribution of 5% increases to:

- 7% (7/1/19 to 6/30/20)
- 9% (7/1/20 to 6/30/21)
- 11% (7/1/21 to 6/30/22)

For employees contributing to Social Security, the current contribution of 2.25% increases to:

- 4.25% (7/1/19 to 6/30/20)

Sec. 3 charges the Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations, in consultation with the State Employees Retirement Commission, to make recommendation to the Secretary of the Office of Policy and Management by December 1, 2019, on a new tier for MERS modelled after the State Employees Retirement System.

SENATE BILL ## LCO 4520 AN ACT CONCERNING EDUCATION INITIATIVES AND SERVICES IN CONNECTICUT

Summary of Proposal:

This proposal would establish a Commission on Shared School Services to develop a plan for the sharing or consolidation of school services and school districts, with significant stakeholder involvement and in consultation with the Connecticut Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations (ACIR) and others; establish reporting by local school districts and municipalities on shared services; further encourage sharing of superintendents; provide board of education meeting date flexibility and more financial transparency and cooperation; add social-emotional learning, trauma-informed instruction and behavior management strategies to in-service training and other requirements; enhance collaboration between SDE, local and regional boards of education, and RESCs on improving efforts to meet the needs of students receiving special education and related services by evaluating existing models and funding mechanisms, recommending cooperative and regional models, and establishing Centers for Excellence; require parents who home school their children to register with their school district and require SDE and boards of education to post grade-level standards and curriculum online.

This proposal adds components to be addressed in a school building project application, prioritizes school construction for expansion of cooperating and regional school districts with a 25% reimbursement bonus capped at 95%, converts diversity school projects from a flat reimbursement rate of 80% to a 10% reimbursement bonus, and caps incorporated or endowed high schools or academies reimbursements at 60%.

Reason for Proposal:

Connecticut is a diverse state with 169 municipalities and 206 school districts, 1,493 public schools/programs and a total enrollment of 535,025 students. There have been discussions for years about more shared services, cooperating agreements, and consolidations of schools and districts. Although efficiency and equity demand further progress toward those goals, Connecticut's public education system is one of its most vital assets and any changes must the result of an inclusive, deliberative process that rewards but does not rush to force partnership.

Significant Impacts:

The work set forth in the bill will require significant effort by members of the Commission on Shared School Services along with education and municipal stakeholders, to resolve many of the challenges on how to better serve Connecticut students while doing so in a $21^{\rm st}$ century fashion.

Section Details:

Sec. 1 establishes the Commission on Shared School Services, to develop a plan for the redistricting or consolidation of school services and school districts. The Commission, with legislative and gubernatorial appointments, is broad-based and to begin work 30 days after passage of the bill. It is staffed by the State Department of Education, with funding of \$800,000 provided in the budget for staff and consultants, and terminates on June 30, 2027.

Sec. 2 charges the Commission with developing a plan and consulting with ACIR. It may establish subcommittees and working groups and conduct hearings. It is to develop 16 reports and recommendations involving myriad stakeholders on a range of topics between November 1, 2019 and October 1, 2020, with a comprehensive report due no later than December 1, 2020 and a hearing by December 15, 2020. Subsequent recommendations may follow.

Sec. 3 requires the Commissioner of Education to solicit proposals through a Request for Information for cooperative arrangements, regionalization of education, and incentives by March 1, 2020, and to share the results with the Commission on Shared School Services.

Sec. 4 requires each municipality and local or regional school board of education to report on which services have been shared or consolidated between them and others, to OPM, SDE and DAS, as well as the Commission on Shared School Services and ACIR, by September 15, 2019. It also requires them to report, by January 1, 2020, on what services will be shared and consolidated, with the same reporting requirements.

Sec. 5 builds upon the changes made in PA 17-2 (JSS) to Sec. 10-157 on shared school superintendents. For the school year commencing July 1, 2020, it encourages a local board of education for a municipality with (1) a population of fewer than ten thousand, (2) one or two elementary schools, or (3) fewer than 2,000 resident students to use a chief executive officer of the board to supervise its schools or to share superintendents. Districts who prefer to retain a separate superintendent will have the cost subtracted from their ECS funds.

Sec. 6 changes the meeting requirements for local and regional boards of education when superintendents are jointly employed.

Sec. 7 requires each regional board of education to establish a regional board of finance to review and make recommendations on the regional board of education's budget and expenses.

Sec. 8 states that the provisions of the general statutes on education shall apply to the operation of an incorporated or endowed high school or academy.

Sec. 9 increases the transparency of the governance and finances of an incorporated or endowed high school or academy.

Sec. 10 amends Sec. 10-223d on the expulsion of pupils.

Sec. 11 requires the State Department of Education, in consultation with a variety of stakeholders, to conduct a study and make recommendations on (1) the development of training and reporting requirements for pediatricians and child care providers to better identify a child's need for special education services; (2) incorporation of training on social-emotional learning, trauma and behavior in teacher-prep and professional development programs; and (3) improving efforts to meet the needs of students with special needs and students receiving special education services. As part of the effort, SDE is to collaborate with local and regional boards of education and RESCs on improving efforts to meet the needs of students receiving special education and related services. They will evaluate existing models and funding mechanisms for the services, including cooperative and regional models, and the establishment of Centers for Excellence.

Sec. 12 includes the Commissioner of SDE, or the commissioner's designee, on each RESC board.

Secs. 13-16 add social-emotional learning, trauma-informed instruction and behavior management strategies to in-service training and other requirements.

Sec. 17 requires parents who provide home instruction to register in their school district that they are providing such instruction.

Sec. 18 requires SDE to make model curricula and frameworks in reading and math for grades Pre-K to four available to parents who are registered to provide home school instruction and on its website.

Sec. 19 requires SDE to review grade level standards and consider expanding the model curricula and frameworks to include grades five to eight, inclusive.

Sec. 20 requires each local and regional board of education to make its grade level curriculum available on its website annually, effective July 1, 2020.

Sec. 21 adds components to be addressed in a school building project application, including the board of education's efforts to collaborate with other local or regional boards of education to reduce under-enrollment in the schools, documentation that the application meets evidence-based practices on a school's size, enrollment and academic program, and documentation of the building's existing condition.

Sec. 22 requires that any local school building committee include at least one member who has experience in the construction industry.

Sec. 23 revises Sec. 10-285a on school building projects with applications made after July 1, 2019, by prioritizing cooperative and regional school district expansion projects with a 25% reimbursement bonus and 95% reimbursement cap and converts diversity school projects from an 80% reimbursement rate to a 10% reimbursement bonus.

Sec. 24 caps the reimbursement rate for an incorporated or endowed high school or academy at 60% rather than the current 85%.

Sec. 24 adds RESC buildings that have received state funding to others where title reverts to the state if the building ceases to be used as a school within 20 years of legislative approval.

Sec. 25 amends the diversity school statute to be consistent with the 10% reimbursement bonus.



A Path Forward

Proposed Budget FY 2020 – 2021

Anchored by honesty, data, and stakeholder input, Governor Lamont's pro-growth budget proposes the structural changes necessary to address the state's crushing fixed costs, while also investing in transportation, education and workforce/economic development. It's a budget that makes tough choices, strategic investments and ensures that we put Connecticut on a path to growth for all its citizens.

Structural Reform for a Sustainable Future: Connecticut will *never* achieve long-term financial stability if we don't deal with the growing fixed costs of the Teacher Retirement System (TRS), the State Employment Retirement System (SERS) and our long-term debt obligations. Gov. Lamont's budget includes:

- A plan, in coordination with the State Treasurer, to refinance TRS payments to allow the state
 the breathing room necessary to make payments <u>and</u> investments in the state. Gov. Lamont's
 plan also reduces the investment return assumption a smart response to recent market
 performance.
- A plan, in coordination with the State Comptroller, to negotiate a maximum price the state will pay for state employees/retirees at hospitals, clinics and providers, instead of paying costs that are all over the map and have nothing to do with quality care. In addition, the Governor's proposal enhances the "Smart Shopper" program which incentivizes state employees to select medical procedures at quality facilities that offer lower costs to both the employee and the state.
- A proposal that asks municipalities to make a small contribution towards normal costs of teachers' pensions, gently phasing it in over 3 years. Towns that have above-average salaries would contribute an additional amount. This proposal ensures that municipalities have some skin in the game and that the pension burden is shared more fairly.
- An honest look at automatic Cost-of-Living Adjustments (COLAs) for future retirees. Gov. Lamont
 will ask for risk-sharing in retiree COLAs similar to what is already in place with the Teacher's
 Retirement System. When the market performs well, retirees will get a higher COLA. When it
 doesn't their COLA isn't as generous.
- A "Debt Diet" that reduces authorizations by 40% to help us control the rise of debt service in the future.
- A proposal to bring our tax code into the 21st century and make it fairer by capturing consumer-oriented services, a growing segment of our economy, and equalizing the tax treatment on digital expenditures. This proposal will put things like buying a movie DVD at the store and streaming that same movie online on par.

Key Investments: Governor Lamont's proposed investments focus on transportation, education and workforce/economic development to get Connecticut growing again.

Transportation

- Provides options for a discussion about a sustainable path for long-term investment, and solvency to upgrade Connecticut's transportation system to the 21st century

Connecticut is home to 17 Fortune 500 companies, thousands of small businesses and a growing start-up ecosystem. We have access to world-class talent. We are equidistant between Boston and New York without the exceptionally high cost of living. And we have vibrant cultural and educational institutions across the state. Governor Lamont's path forward understands that we can't move forward without addressing the structural issues that have held us back. At the same time, we can't afford to wait until all of our fiscal problems have resolved to make the critical investments necessary to position Connecticut for growth. Gov. - Because we need to bring the state's transportation system into the 21st century, and understanding that we'll need a reliable, sustainable source of revenue to do so, Gov. Lamont's budget models out two tolling scenarios - truck-only and cars and trucks.
- Gov. Lamont does not support raising the gas tax or using priority bonding.
- Any tolling proposal would need to maximize the discount for Connecticut EZ-Pass users and frequent drivers.
- It's estimated that out-of-state drivers could provide over 40% of tolling revenue for Connecticut. That's money we're leaving on the table.
- Gov. Lamont's budget is the beginning not the end of this honest conversation that we need to have.
