April 12, 2018

Weekly Legislative Feature Issues:

After the final committee deadline passed, the Connecticut General Assembly took little time before jumping in to session. This week, the House convened for session twice (Tuesday, April 10th and Wednesday, April 11th), which proved relatively productive--moving a number of executive and legislative nominations out to the Senate as well as addressing several substantive bills. Additionally, the Senate convened for session on Wednesday, April 11, 2018 and acted on the nominations as well as several substantive bills, including an emergency certified bill that was transmitted directly following pass in the House, [HB No. 5592](#): **AN ACT WAIVING ANY PENALTIES IMPOSED ON A BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR MAKING REDUCTIONS TO ITS BUDGETED APPROPRIATION FOR EDUCATION AS A RESULT OF CUTS TO ITS EDUCATION COST-SHARING GRANT FOR FISCAL YEAR 2018**. The House voted 141-1 and the Senate voted 34 to 1 to pass this bill as a means of providing municipalities greater flexibility in addressing budgeting decisions. This bill was immediately transmitted to Governor Malloy for further action.

Moving forward, there is only one month left to go in the legislative session. This means that the General Assembly will begin holding sessions more and more regularly as the session draws towards a conclusion. In addition to the increased tempo of session days, the Appropriations Committee has yet to release a budget with a self-imposed fallback deadline of April 20th. We will be sure to keep you apprised as further details emerge.

This past week has revealed new developments of particular interest to you:

Lawmakers Still Haven't Decided How to Tackle CT's Red Ink

Governor Malloy has been warning the General Assembly to close the deficit. The Appropriations Committee did not meet its final committee deadline and release a midterm budget adjustment package. On the other hand, the Finance, Revenue and Bonding Committee's proposal would add \$130 million to the projected \$260 million budget deficit. Still, the Finance Committee approved on a 50-1 vote, the cancellation of tax hikes, delaying a \$30 million payment from the Mashantucket Pequot and Mohegan tribes to open a casino another year, and reversing the increase in teachers' contributions to their pensions. Sen. Frantz, the Senate Republican Chair of the Finance Committee, remarked that this is all subject to negotiation. Sen. Fonfara, the Senate Democratic Chair of the Finance Committee, said he did not believe that it was his committee's job to come up with the money to fund the Appropriations Committee's priorities. Rep. Ziobron, the ranking member of the Appropriations Committee, voiced her strong opposition to reversing the increase in teacher pension contributions, stating that "the people on Finance, they are looking at things in a silo" and added that "their vote yesterday put a hole in the budget."

The Appropriations Committee's revised deadline for the budget is April 20th. If they do not meet this deadline, the legislature could still adjourn as scheduled because the biennial budget was balanced "on paper" when it was passed last October. This is unusual, but it was done in 2008. Donald Williams of the Connecticut Education Association expressed their strong support for reversing the increase in teacher pension contributions, stating that "teachers were unfairly singled out more than any other group... this is not a problem of their making, and they should not be punished for it." Jan Hoschel of AFT Connecticut also expressed her support for reversal, stating "they [committee members] get that repealing this tax depends on lawmakers taking a more balanced approach to the budget process than the failed austerity policies of the past three years."

After Bill Fails, Amendment Proposed to Assist Homeowners with Crumbling Foundations

Following the rejection of a bill by the Judiciary Committee that would help homeowners with crumbling foundations, Sen. Tim Larson proposed an amendment to another bill requiring a \$10 surcharge to mortgages and insurance policies to help homeowners.

The amendment to SB 377 would:

- Add a \$10 fee on new and renewed mortgage loans after July 1, 2018
- Require insurance companies to pay a \$10 fee on new or renewed homeowners or rental insurance policies after July 1, 2018
- Adds a \$10 surcharge on new or renewed homeowners or rental insurance policies after July 1, 2018(fees shall be sunsetted on June 30, 2025)

- Require all collected fees to be deposited into the Crumbling Foundations Assistance Fund
- Increase the amount of time a homeowner has to provide proof of loss to an insurance company from 60 days to 120 days
- Change the amount of time a homeowner has to take legal action against an insurance company for denying a claim from two years to four years

In a written statement, Larson said “this proposal renews my continued commitment to help out eastern Connecticut homeowners who are still struggling through this horrific ordeal.” Governor Malloy has estimated that up to 34,000 homes in 36 towns were affected.

Legislatives Exempt 2 Towns from School-Spending Requirements

On April 11th, the House voted 141 to 2 and the Senate voted 34 to 1 to exempt schools from the Minimum Budget Requirement or MBR as a result of uncertainty over the state budget. Governor Malloy disagreed with the General Assembly, saying “I don’t get it, to tell you the truth.” Last November, Malloy imposed \$58 million in cuts to 130 municipalities on education. Meanwhile, municipalities were only allowed to cut \$30 million. Municipalities are required to spend at least as much as they did on education as they did the previous year unless enrollment declines. Prior to the exemption, districts could be punished with penalties up to twice the amount of the cuts. This exemption will provide relief for the towns of Canterbury and Montville. More towns are not being affected because they found ways to maintain their spending levels after being threatened with penalties.

Aresimowicz Asks GOP to Drop Partisan Budget Plans

Speaker Joe Aresimowicz said the GOP should not issue their own budget as they have done in previous years. “We are not working on our own budget... I emphatically beg other leaders not to be wasting time and resources on that. Let’s all get to the table and do it together.” said Aresimowicz. House Minority Themis Klarides defended the practice, saying that “I appreciate his [Aresimowicz’s] opinion, but we cannot get to a bipartisan budget unless we start out with all four caucuses [developing] individual ideas.” She also argued that the numerous GOP budget proposals last year helped bring last year’s budget stalemate to an end. The state’s yearly deficit is projected to be \$200 million. House Majority Leader Matt Ritter argued that partisan budgets weren’t necessary in part because both parties have a lot of common ground. Specifically, they want to postpone new restrictions on the Medicare Savings Program, reduce the number of savings that Governor Malloy has to find, and keeping the cap on municipal tax rates at 39 mills instead of automatically increasing to 45 mills. A Republican budget

proposal would likely cut state employee benefits in 2027. Democrats and Malloy argue that this is illegal.

Hartford Bailout Puts XL Center Funding on Ice—At Least for Now

The bailout for Hartford was a factor leading to \$100 million in cuts for the XL Center in the governor's capital improvement project. \$16 million for a new parking garage near the site of the Bushnell was also cut from the budget. "The \$550 million price tag, while only \$30 million a year, it's a little sticker shock, causing members of both caucuses to pause" said Speaker Joe Aresimowicz. He said that funding for both projects would likely reappear in the budget. Chris McClure, a spokesman for Governor Malloy, said that "It is our hope that the final capital budget will include these two important projects with statewide impact." The Capital Region Development Authority (CRDA) is trying to find a buyer for a public-private partnership, but only received one bid. CRDA executive director Michael W. Freimuth explained to legislators why it was so hard to find a buyer: renovating the XL Center would immediately cost \$50 million to renovate while demolishing it will cost \$40 million. Senate Republican Leader Len Fasano has argued against funding the XL Center, saying that the state government shouldn't be involved in running a business, especially until interest from potential buyers is known. Sen. Fonfara said that the funding could be contingent on finding a private investor or a buyer.
