(1400 in FFY 2021 to 1493 in FFY 2022)

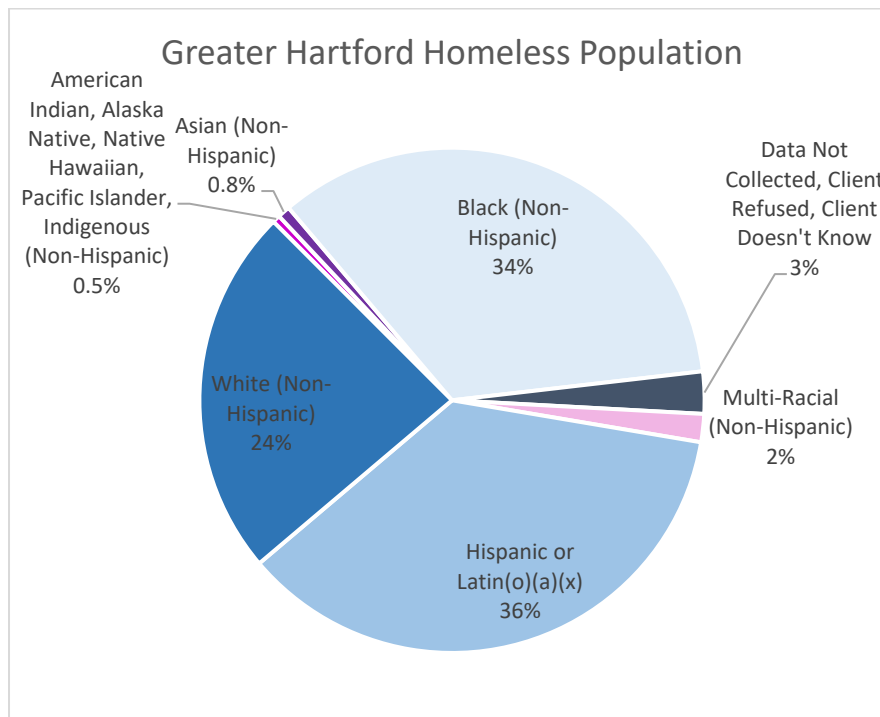
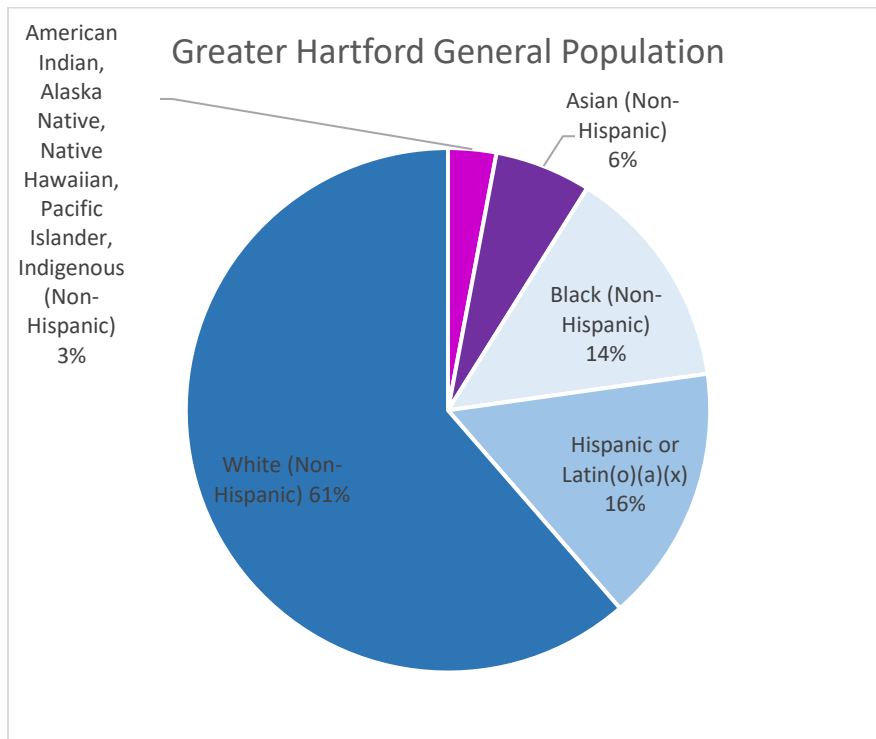

- 342 do not have a government issued ID
